Council financial problems

Council funds -- DO NOT commingle OR TURN OVER council funds to the parish or home associations accounts. The Knights of Columbus are a separate entity.

- Councils have fiduciary duty over the HA.
- Financial Secretary cannot write checks. Or be on bank account.
- Council's dues are NOT FUNDRAISERS -- SEE BYLAWS
- If you change ANY part of your bylaws i.e., increase council dues -- YOU MUST USE ONLINE BYLAWS -- NO ADDITIONS OR DELETIONS

Texas is one of the largest and most diverse jurisdictions in the Order, and the legal issues we encounter are no less so. To list them all would be excessive for this report, so I am setting forth some issues we frequently encounter.

References for Legal Support

An abundance of training is provided by Supreme and TSC. Please take advantage of this training as it equips you to solve many of the problems you encounter in your Councils and Assemblies. Nothing feels better than to recognize a problem and then solve it without having to agonize over whether you made the correct decision. If you encounter a problem that was not addressed in your training, please log in to Officers Online and go to the tab for the “Officers Desk Reference” or ODR. The ODR is organized into helpful sections with topics frequently encountered in the day-to-day operation of your Council or Assembly. I encourage you to check the ODR for an answer to your problem before going anywhere else for the solution.

If you cannot find the answer in the ODR, please ask your officers for help, such as your trustees. Or go to your District Deputy for advice. If he doesn’t know, you should ask your Diocesan Deputy or an Assistant Diocesan Deputy. If there is still an issue or concern after addressing the matter at the diocesan level, please give me a call and I will do what I can to help. Safe Environment Training

The Grand Knight, Program Director (usually the Deputy Grand Knight), Family Director and Community Director are each required to take the Knights of Columbus safe environment training. Completing the safe environment training helps to protect you, your Council, and the Order in the event there is a reported incident of sexual abuse. This is not the same safe environment training that a liturgical minister receives from the Diocese. One training course will not be substituted for the other, as they are put forth by different entities. Always follow your Bishop’s guidance regarding safe environment training.

Liability Insurance

All Councils and Assemblies should have liability insurance. K of C Councils are entities separate and apart from the Catholic Church, so the insurance that might cover your Parish, does not necessarily cover Council activities that you conduct at the Parish, nor all individuals who participate or attend those events or activities. If your Council is sued and you do not have insurance, neither TSC nor Supreme provides legal counsel to defend you or to pay any judgment that may be found against you. The Knights of Columbus has a program with Lockton Affinity, LLC to provide insurance for Councils and Assemblies. Premiums are reasonable (\$2.64 per member plus a \$35 admin fee for \$1 million in

coverage) and are based upon the number of members in your Council or Assembly. Liability insurance should be a line item in every Council and Assembly budget. Lockton Affinity may be contacted at (800) 496-0288 or by e-mail at CouncilInsurance@locktonaffinity.com, or on the web at locktonaffinity.com.

Home Corporations

A Council cannot own real property or real estate, however, Home Corporations can. Home Corporations exist to support their associated Councils. There are still many Home Corporations in Texas, but there are less with each passing year. This often has to do with aging facilities that become cost-prohibitive to maintain, resulting in sales of the Home Corporation real estate. If you become aware that your Home Corporation is contemplating a sale, please notify me. There are documents and procedures that should be put in place to ensure that the sale is conducted properly. There are rules that apply to the proceeds of sale of the real estate and other legal issues that are unique to “halls.” If you are having an issue with your Home Corporation, please consult the Home Corporation tab in Officers Online. Please call me if you cannot find the answer to your question or if you would like to discuss it.

Council Bylaws

Gone are the days when a Council tailors bylaws unique to its circumstances. All Councils should be using the template bylaws found on the Supreme website. This is to ensure uniformity among Councils throughout the Order. No variations are allowed. Established Councils should be converting their bylaws to the template bylaws if they haven’t already. Under certain circumstances, Supreme will infer or construe your Council to have bylaw provisions set forth in the template, even if you have not formally adopted the template bylaws.

Dispute Resolution

Everyone makes mistakes, even Brother Knights. When this happens, Fraternal Correction should be used to resolve the matter at the Council level, setting pride aside and keeping in mind the principles of charity, unity, and fraternity. The principle of subsidiarity is encouraged, i.e., to resolve the dispute at the lowest possible level, learn from it, and move on. Someone aggrieved at the Council level should not be contacting the TSC or Supreme to complain or redress grievances that should be resolved on the Council, District, or Diocesan levels. In those situations, in which a dispute cannot be resolved locally, please respect the “chain of command” and take it to your District Deputy. The

DD can then take it up with the Diocesan Deputy if he feels the need to do so. The State Advocate can then be contacted if the Diocesan Deputy and DD desire further advice and guidance.

Please note that the dispute resolution referred to above, is separate and apart from reporting violations or incidents of sexual abuse per safe environment training. Please contact the Supreme Office of Youth Protection if you become aware of a reportable event. Also contact your Parish, Diocesan Office of Youth Protection, and report the matter to law enforcement authorities. Please notify the State Advocate as soon as possible with information regarding the arrest or conviction of a Brother Knight for a sex offense.

Closing thoughts

Knights often find themselves in situations where they really don't know whether they are dealing with a legal issue. Please remember that "No question is too dumb to ask," so if in doubt, please ask.

Brothers All, The Texas State Council serves an important function in guiding, training, executing the many important meetings throughout the year as well as serving the many councils and Knights in Texas. To be able to fund the Texas State Council, a mandatory state per capita of \$10 per member is levied annually for every member in Texas who are on council rosters as of July 1 every year. I am proud to report that as of February 28, 2025, 87.36% of all councils have paid their share! We have 97 dormant councils this year that are also assessed. Looking at just active councils we are down to only 39 that still need to pay State per Capita for a total of \$22,599.75. Great job Texas!

To participate in the upcoming State Convention in Corpus Christi, earn state awards, participate in state events such as the free throw contest, etc., councils need to complete their state per capita payments. Paper statements were mailed to all Financial Secretaries July 2024. To pay there are two options. Original State and Diocesan Goals

The goals for new councils and council reactivations for this year were as follows.

- 15 new councils (1 per diocese)
- 13 reactivated council (1 per diocese except for Tyler and Victoria, which had no suspended councils)

Supreme had two incentives that allowed the State Council to reduce our membership goal for the year. They were:

- For every ten online members converted to council membership, the State membership goal was reduced by one.
- If the State Council hit the following annual percentages of membership growth by the following dates, 2.5% of the original membership goal was subtracted from the state goal. Those dates and percentage were: September 30, 2024 – 20%; December 3, 2024 – 50%; March 31, 2025 – 75%.

Year End Results

As of July 1, 2025, the Texas State Council recruited **5524 new members** into the Order.

The following goal reductions were achieved. Online Membership Conversion Reductions:

- July – 10
- August – 10
- September – 17
- October – 43
- November – 20
- December – 21
- January – 30
- February – 32
- March – 33
- April – 27
- May – 37
- June – 45

In addition, the following annual progress goals were met:

- September 30, 2024 – 20% met – Reduction of 132
- December 3, 2024 – 50% met – Reduction of 132
- March 1, 2025 – 75% met – Reduction of 132

With these reductions, the membership goal as of July 1, 2025, was **4579 members**. So, growth as of this date was **120.64%** of modified goal, which qualified Texas for the **Circle of Honor with Pinnacle Status**.

Council Status

As of July 1, 2025, there were 867 councils assigned to Texas. Of these, 142 were designated inactive and 19 were suspended, resulting in 706 active councils in Texas.

All Councils Active

As of July 1, 2025, of the 706 active councils, 115 (16.3%) were recruitment inactive.

Online Membership

As of July 1, 2025, Texas had recruited 4424 online members into the Order. This was 137% of our annual online membership goal, which led Division 1.

Of those, 3223 were converted to council membership. This was a 73% conversion rate, which exceeded our historical rate of 68%.

2024-2025 REPORT OF THE STAR COUNCIL AWARDS DIRECTOR **David Zeigler**

The Star Council Award is the highest Award that the Supreme Council has available to any council. Councils can earn this award for making their assigned goals for membership, insurance, and service program activities in the areas of Faith, Family, Community and Life. This award is a health check each year for the council. Councils earning the Star Council Award exhibit behaviors most seen in successful councils. Every Council can be a Star Council – planning, execution, and plan modifications is the key to achieving this high honor.

Star Council Award Requirements:

1. Earn the **Father McGivney Award** for membership growth by June 30 each fraternal year.
2. Earn the **Founders' Award** for insurance growth by June 30 each fraternal year.

3. Earn the **Columbian Award** for Faith in Action programs by June 30 each fraternal year.
4. Submit the **Service Program Personnel Report** (Form 365) due by July 1 each fraternal year.
5. Submit the **Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity** (Form 1728) due by January 31 each fraternal year.
6. **Safe Environment.** Be compliant by May 1 each fraternal year for the following positions:
 - Grand Knight
 - Program Director
 - Family Director (background check required)
 - Community Director (background check required)
 - Columbian Squires Counselors (if applicable) (background check required)

7. Councils must be current with **Supreme Per Capita** twice during the year; prior to October 10 each fraternal year & April 10 each fraternal year.

Lone Star Awards Requirements:

Texas also has awards above and beyond the Star Council Award: The Lone Star Award for Excellence and the Lone Star Award for Excellence with Distinction.

The requirements for the Lone Star Award for Excellence are:

1. Earn the Star Council Award.
2. Submit Form 185 by July 1 each fraternal year.
3. Pay State Per Capita by March 1 each fraternal year.
4. Meet State Charity Goal by June 30 each fraternal year.
5. Seat at least one delegate at the State Convention each fraternal year.
6. Submit Form 1295 Semi-Annual Audit by August 15 each fraternal year & February 15 each fraternal year.

The requirements for the Lone Star Award for Excellence with Distinction are:

1. Earn the Lone Star Award for Excellence.

2. Submit Form 185 by July 1 each fraternal year.
3. Pay State Per Capita by December 31 each fraternal year.
4. Meet State Charity Goal by December 31 each fraternal year.
5. Be Safe Environment Compliant by December 31 each fraternal year.
6. Participate in (1) Fraternal Benefit Event by December 31.
7. Seat one or two delegates at the State Convention each fraternal year.
 - a. Councils with 99 members or less – (1) delegate.
 - b. Councils with 100 members or more (2) delegates.
8. Submit Form 10784 for Special Olympics by January 31 each fraternal year.
9. Submit at least one entry for a State Service Program Award or Family of the Year or Blessed Fr. McGivney Chaplain Award or Educational Grant by March 1 each fraternal year.

Star District Award Requirements:

District Deputies are recognized for excellence by Supreme when meeting the following requirements:

1. Meet membership goal (70% of combined council quotas).
2. Meet 50% of the Councils in his District earn the Founder's Award.
3. Submit Form 944 for each council due by September 15 each fraternal year. For this fraternal year 98% of the DD's submitted all 944 forms covering 98% of all Councils. Great Job DD's. You can have 100% next fraternal year!
4. Have at least one council in the district earn Star Council.

Star Tracker Report

The Star Tracker Report is maintained and published twice a month as data is available from multiple sources (Supreme and State). This report tracks each council's progress towards the Star Council and the Lone Star Awards.

Reports are sent to Diocesan, District Deputies, Grand Knights, & Financial Secretaries via our Constant Contact email platform.

Year to Date Progress:

On June 30, 2025, there were 725 active councils in Texas. Of these, the following Star Council forms have been submitted:

Report of Officers Chosen Forms 185 – 725 submitted (100%)

Service Program Personnel Report Form 365 – 725 submitted (100%)

Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity Form 1728 – 477 submitted (66%)

As of this date, 339 (46.8%) are at 100%+ of their membership goal for the year. 325 councils (448.8%) have met their Fraternal Benefit Event goal for the year. Also as of this date, 407 councils (56.1%) in Texas were fully Safe Environment Compliant.

As of June 30, 2025, 259 Councils achieved Star Council Status. A new record for the Order.

Of the 259 Star Councils, 146 councils earned the Lone Star Award for Excellence (LSAFE) and 55 councils earned the Lone Star Award for Excellence with Distinction (LSAFED).

As of June 30, 2025, 93 District Deputies earned Star District status. 14 of these Star Districts were All Star Districts, meaning all councils in the district earned Star Council.

The Faith In Action program is made up of Faith, Family, Community, and Life, the 4 categories, and 32 programs empowers Knights to come together to share their Catholic faith, celebrate fraternity with loved ones, and stand shoulder to shoulder in service to the community and to defend life at all stages and in every condition.

Pilgrim Icon

Edvaro "Eddie" García, Chairman

Our New Pilgrim Icon is the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Through the Pilgrim Icon Program, councils organize a Sacred Heart Holy Hour featuring an icon depicting the most famous image of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, painted in 1767 by Pompeo Batoni and now venerated in the Church of the Gesù in Rome. The reproduction bears the blessing of Pope Francis, through the Papal Almoner, and is one of more than 300 icons traveling across the world, from council to council, for veneration and use in prayer services.

The Sacred Heart Holy Hour includes readings from Sacred Scripture and reflections from Pope Francis on the Sacred Heart, as well as the Divine Mercy Chaplet, prayers to the Sacred Heart and time for silent prayer. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament may also be included. Following the holy hour, families are encouraged to enthronize the Sacred Heart in their homes by placing an image of the Sacred Heart in a place of honor and conducting an enthronement ceremony.

Since the first traveling pilgrim icon of Our Lady of Guadalupe in 1979, more than 191,000 council and parish prayer services with some 23 million participants have been held.

The #10682 Guide Sheet provides a step-by-step process that any member can follow during this successful program element. The actual prayer service can take anywhere from 30 minutes to an hour dependent on the time constraints and the wishes of your pastor. While it is always preferable to have your pastor or clergy involved, they are not required. It is suggested you involve as many parishioners and parish organizations as possible to have the broadest impact.

Order your prayer books and prayer cards 6 weeks in advance of the planned service to avoid backorder delays and having to print PDFs for participants. Do not forget to complete #10784 before you leave the event from your phone.

Spread devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and pray for Our Lord to make his heart our own, so that we may see and love in others what he sees and loves in us.

Silver Rose

And the primary way to provide this support by following the RSVP program Guide Sheet #10601. This guide provides details for the Vocations or Faith Program Chairman to follow. By completing a \$500 donation to support a Seminarian or Religious Postulant/Aspirant and submission of the RSVP Refund Application form #2863, your council achieves two points in the Faith segment of the Faith in Action Program.

Also remember to send our seminarians Christmas and Easter cards, birthday greetings and invitations to council and assembly events. Many councils participate in Vocations Awareness Days, Seminarian Support events and Clergy Appreciation dinners. Support for seminarians through various programs should be reported on the Fraternal Program Report Form #10784 under the Faith segment of the Faith in Action Program.

It is imperative that the RSVP program is coordinated through the Diocesan Vocations office to provide the funding where it is most needed. And for each \$500 donation to a Seminarian or Religious

Postulant/Aspirant, a \$100 rebate can be obtained from Supreme by completing the Refund Application form #2863. This form can be downloaded from the Supreme website along with other RSVP resources including The Guide Sheet #10601, The Vocations Handbook #1942, Father McGivney Prayer Card #10502, Tri-fold Brochure #4688 and RSVP Poster #10743.

The Culture of Life continues to be in the forefront of Council activities in the great State of Texas! We continue to celebrate the milestone for Life when the Roe v. Wade decision was reversed on 6/24/2022!! With this our Texas laws went into place, forbidding the taking of an unborn child's life in this great state. We are not done. The reversal of Roe v. Wade is not the end of the war, but instead the beginning of our greatest challenge – to change the heart of a nation. To help our country to embrace Life and to care for all unborn children and their moms.

Thanks to all who have participated in the Pro-Life Programs and by doing so have helped to save many babies from the horrors of abortion. Knights and their ladies have taken the Culture of Life message back to their Diocese, Districts, Councils, and communities and lives are being changed, and many babies have been saved and hearts opened to Life.

The ACE Wings remains a barometer on the health of Pro-Life activities in our state. We remain solid and steadfast in our defense of the unborn as well as those who are at risk of losing their lives such as the terminally ill and those on death row.

Please do not forget that each ACE Wing represent a child lost to abortion – we wear these wings to show others that their life would have mattered, and that they would have enjoyed all the wonders that life brings to each of us... to wear them is a sign that you are a strong man of Christ, willing to place the weakest of the weak on your shoulders and to carry them, for Life!

To date (March 2025), 237 ACE Wings have been earned in Texas, up from 233 just a year ago. Of these 233 ACE Wings earned 61 went to our ladies who worked alongside their husbands, our brothers, defending life. Another 11 Councils presented ACE Wings to thank individuals in their communities for their Culture of Life efforts. I hope these numbers will increase significantly through the end of our fraternal year.

The Special Forces ACE Wings continue to grow in popularity. To date this fraternal year 114 SFAW have been sent out to Knights with 35 of these going

to spouses.

The Gold ACE Wings, the Texas State Council Pro Life Hall of Fame, is doing well with the majority of Diocesan Deputies take great care to choose candidates. We have increased the number of Gold ACE Wings available to each Diocese to two each (plus spouses). Please encourage your Diocesan Deputy to recognize men in their respective Diocese for the Gold ACE Wings.

Encourage your Diocesan Deputy to recognize some of the priests or deacons who go above and beyond for Life. I have to thank the Diocesan Culture of Life Chairmen for their work within their respective Diocese, for without them and their tireless efforts, the Culture of Life face of Texas would look much different. I also wish to thank the Culture of Life Chairman in each Council... for they are the ones who bring the Culture of Life message to each brother Knight in Texas.

So, have you earned the right to wear the ACE Wings? If not, then we challenge you to become one soon... your work might save a future teacher, engineer, or even a Priest... we lose 150 babies every hour of every day throughout the United States... we cannot change this unless every Knight and his lady get involved! God's blessings to all my Brother Knights and thank you for caring about Life!

This fraternal year has been a good year for the Ultrasound Initiative. Texas continues to purchase new Ultrasound machines either for new centers or to update an old, outdated machine. I believe one of the best things we can do to increase our ultrasounds is by looking at our past. I would encourage all councils to reach out to pregnancy centers who have received an ultrasound machine from this program and see if an update is needed. These machines are always being updated, and top end ultrasound machines 5 years ago are not as clear as the machines that are currently out.

It is important to remember that even though abortions had been limited in Texas, these machines are still needed to help educate abortion minded women to truly show the beauty of life that is their child. Remember, a mother is more likely to choose life if she sees an ultrasound of her baby! This is a great way to stay connected and show continued support for our pregnancy centers around our Great State. My hope is that through this strategy we will be able to double our efforts to support our local Pregnancy Resource Centers and also save lives.

2024-2025 REPORT OF THE STATE EDUCATION, TRAINING AND COMMUNICATIONS DIRECTOR

The mission of the Texas State Council Education, Training, and Communication Team is to provide council, district, and diocesan leadership for the Knights in the State of Texas information and training to help them be successful leaders. Our main audience are the grand knights, financial secretaries, trustees, council directors, district deputies, and diocesan deputies who are the heart and soul of the Texas State Council. We provide onsite and virtual training seminars for council leadership, and work with the other major directors at various meetings with the district and diocesan deputies to provide information all the way down to the local council level.

Education & Training

Several meetings for leadership were held across the state throughout the year. We kicked off the year by gathering in Houston for the Organization Meeting July 5th-7th. At this meeting we celebrated the successes of the past fraternal year but also turned the page quickly to the current year. Our Worthy State Deputy laid out the goals for the Texas State Council. The Major Directors all made presentations laying out their agendas, explaining where and how they planned to achieve them.

Following the Organizational Meeting, attention was then turned to each of the 15 dioceses across the state where our State Deputy and Major Directors laid out the goals at a local level. These conferences were held throughout July and early August 2024.

In October, our Worthy State Deputy and Major Directors met with the Diocesan Deputies to review the first quarter of the fraternal year and to layout plans for continued success through the rest of the year.

In December 2024, we held our Mid-Year meeting. Our Worthy State Deputy and Major Directors recapped the successes of the first 6 months and laid out the road map to finish the year where we want to be with Circle of Honor and Pinnacle Status. Each director met with leaders from each diocese in a smaller group to address concerns on a more local level.

In December and January, our Worthy State Deputy and Major Directors once again hit the road to take the messages from the Mid-Year Meeting and present them to the general membership at the

diocesan level. The goal was to get our local council leaders fired up to keep their councils striving toward great things.

In March, as we finished the 3rd quarter, our Worthy State Deputy and Major Directors convened at the State Free Throw Competition in San Antonio. This was another opportunity for each director to sit down with the Diocesan Deputies and make those final plans to get their councils to the highest level of success.

Finally, the 121st State Convention is being held April 25th- 27th in Corpus Christi, Texas. Breakout sessions with the Major Directors will be held and all will be available to answer questions with the purpose of making our local councils the best they can be.

Communications

In early 2025, the Texas State Council re-branded the State website. It was a dramatic overhaul that was months in the making. That site is still in its infancy; however, the site is very user friendly, and it should be much easier to locate specific information that the user is looking for. If you have not been to www.tkofc.org in a while, you should look at the new design.

The Finish Line newsletter continues to be published and sent out on the first of each month. You can find archived issues on the new website under the NEWS tab. Our Worthy State Deputy and each Major Director offers tidbits to get each council through the next few months.

Constant Contact continues to be the mass email publisher used to get out emails across the State Council. Currently there are just under 69,000 subscribers to this platform. Emails are sent from all the Major Directors several times a month.

2024-2025 REPORT OF THE STATE EVANGELIZATION AND FAITH FORMATION DIRECTOR

Welcome Brother Knights to the 121st Annual Convention of the Texas State Council in Corpus Christi, Texas.

One hundred and forty-three years ago, Fr. Michael McGivney along with the founding members of Council 1, San Salvador, began what today is the largest Catholic men's fraternal organization comprised of nearly 2 million men who are a part of 16,000 councils worldwide. Blessed McGivney had a number of reasons why he began the Knights of Columbus but chief among them was "to form its members in Catholic faith and virtue," and "to unite members in their Catholic identity and the practice of their Catholic faith" (Section 2, Charter Constitution and Laws of the Knights of Columbus). Allowing men to come together to pray, be formed in their Catholic faith and share in fraternity were of the upmost importance to our founder; whose zeal for the salvation of souls was a driving force in his life and ministry. Today, we as Catholic men, more than ever, are called to renew the vision of Blessed Fr. McGivney. To make Jesus Christ the source and summit of all that we do; and ensure our Catholic faith, missionary zeal, and the proclamation of the Kingdom of God permeates all aspects of council life and membership engagement.

As such, we want to reiterate 4 promises the Knights of Columbus make to all our Brother Knights and prospective Brothers:

1. To help all men grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ
2. To provide opportunities for men to serve Christ in His Church including being a missionary disciple
3. To provide opportunities for men to serve those most in need in their communities and around the world IN THE NAME OF CHRIST JESUS

4. A promise to provide protection and aid to widows and orphans through our insurance arm

Men today are hungry for faith centered content and fraternity that help them grow in faith and become better Catholic men, husbands, and fathers. We know that our Catholic parishes and families need men who are faith-filled leaders who strive to grow in holiness, knowledge and to disciple others toward the Kingdom of Heaven. We are firm in our understanding that this goal is accomplished through prayer, formation, and fraternity. Our Worthy Supreme Knight has proclaimed that as Knights, we strive to be “first in faith and first in charity.” Therefore, our aim with the Evangelization and Faith Formation (EFF) initiative is to provide Catholic men the opportunity to grow in their Baptismal call to holiness and understanding of our Catholic faith to better guide their family and to better know and share Jesus Christ with those in their daily lives.

So how do we ensure that we are first in faith?

Our first step is ensuring every council has an appointed EFF Director appointed by the Grand Knight. The Council EFF Director will be an active fraternal leader in your council beyond COR, assisting to further “unite members in their Catholic identity and the practice of their Catholic faith”. Part of the Council EFF Director’s role besides COR, is to collaborate with council leadership, especially their Membership and Programs directors, to create Christ centered messaging and add in faith and prayer elements to existing events that are already successful for your council. Appointing a Council EFF Director will allow them to be aided by our State Team and Supreme in assisting your council with this great mission which was at the heart of Blessed McGivney’s vision for his Knights.

In addition to assisting the council in putting faith and prayer at the center of all council activities and membership engagement, the Council EFF Director and team with the approval of their Pastor have the opportunity establish COR for all men of their Parish. COR is Latin for heart and the root word for courage. COR exists to form and strengthen Catholic men in faith and virtue as missionary disciples by drawing them into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ through prayer, formation, and fraternity. The goal of each COR gathering is to provide the opportunity for men, all men of the Parish to encounter Jesus Christ, to strive to be more Christ like, to strengthen our bonds of brotherhood, and to prepare for the courageous mission of evangelization.

Cor is intentional time for prayer, formation, and fraternity for all men of your Parish. Cor can be started on its own or be tailored to strengthen

existing men’s ministry already bringing men together in your parish. If we think of our faith-life as a grape vine or hop bine, we need structure to keep us on the right path. Formation in our Catholic faith and catechesis are the trellis, the structure and guide which we grow up around. But in order to grow strong, we need some additional components. Fraternity, we need good soil, like a strong brotherhood that surrounds us, protects us and sustains us allowing us to be rooted as we grow. We also need prayer, which nourishes like water and feeds like the sun. Prayer is an essential in our faith life, it is where we dialogue and encounter God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. “[Prayer] is a vital and personal relationship with the living and true God (CCC 2558).” So prayer and fraternity are the catalysts for growth with formation being the guiding structure. Cor can be extremely fruitful for the growth of any existing men’s ministry with a formation focus by feeding men with intentional prayer and strengthening with fraternity.

Our team would love to assist your council in establishing COR within your council, to help men of your parish grow in their Catholic faith and relationship with Jesus Christ. COR is the first stage of a multi-year roll out of the Evangelization and Faith Formation initiative here in Texas in conjunction with Supreme. Our role is to assist councils as they strive to form Catholic men in virtue and identity, building up the Kingdom of God and strengthening them to better serve their families, Church, and communities.

I wish to convey my sincere gratitude and humble thanks to our State Deputy Ron Alonzo for entrusting myself and the State EFF Team of John Danley, Will Britten and Jose Ramos; with the charge to renew Blessed Fr. McGivney’s vision of forming men in their Catholic faith and helping them grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ at the council level here in Texas. Thank you to our Worthy State Chaplin Bishop Mulvey and our Associate Chaplain Fr. Tommy Chen for their guidance and prayers for our state leadership and for all Knights of Columbus here in Texas.

Thank you to both Ron and our First Lady Margo for their leadership and to all the other State Officers, Directors, and their spouses as they strive to carry on the numerous other works of Unity and Charity that Blessed McGivney had in vision when establishing his Knights. I would like to thank my wife Hollie for her prayers; and for affording me the time to serve you, my Brother Knights. Lastly thank you to you, my brothers of the Knights of Columbus in Texas, for all the prayer and work “ora et labora” that you put in at the council level, carrying on the mission of

Blessed Michael McGivney for the zeal of souls.

American Wheelchair Mission

The recent fraternal year recorded 245 Councils, 5 Assemblies. Total contributions were \$1,561,788, versus the previous year's \$1,239,052, for an increase of \$322,736. This allowed for the purchase of 20,412 wheelchairs. Since it is estimated that each wheelchair delivered changes and improves an average of 10 lives, you impacted the lives of 104,120 people! California, our closest competitor, raised \$334,196 for 2,228 wheelchairs.

The Knights of Columbus and the American Wheelchair Mission raise funds to buy wheelchairs for global distribution, including in the USA. Each Council should try to donate at least \$150 for one wheelchair. Please consider including this in your council budget.

A parish-wide Wheelchair Drive over one or two weekends effectively raises funds and informs parishioners. Some parishes use pulpit talks and announcements during Masses to enhance their drive's success.

Steps:

1. Get the pastor's permission.
2. Coordinate with parish staff to choose a date and avoid conflicts.
3. Publicize the event six weeks in advance via parish channels.
4. Share details with parish organizations.
5. Obtain announcement and materials from AWM
6. On event day, read the talk at all Masses and set up a donation/info table in the narthex.

Small containers ship 110 wheelchairs for \$16,500; large ones ship 280 for \$42,000. The American Wheelchair Mission manages procurement and shipment.

Organizing a Wheelchair Drive raises funds and recruits new members, highlighting charity as our Order's first principle. If a Parish-wide Drive isn't feasible, Grand Knights should aim to raise \$150 for one wheelchair.

Bishop Thomas J. Flanagan Fund - Grants for Retired Priests

Named after Bishop Thomas J. Flanagan, this fund honors his service as Auxiliary Bishop in San Antonio (1998-2005) and State Chaplain for Texas (2000-2002).

Supporting the Bishop Thomas J. Flanagan Fund aids retired priests' care. The fund is mainly financed by Texas K of C Specialty License plates from the Texas DMV. Direct contributions are also accepted. Each year, the fund balance is divided among Texas's 15 dioceses, providing grants for retired priests.

It is easy to participate in this program. Simply visit the myplates.com website or the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles website at txdmv.gov. Search for the Knights of Columbus license plates and the example of the license plate will display the Knights of Columbus emblem and the statement "One Nation Under God" at the bottom of the license plate. The Texas Department of Motor Vehicles submits \$22 for each new or renewed license plate to the Knights of Columbus State Council Charities. At the end of each

fraternal year, the total funds are distributed equally among the 15 dioceses across Texas providing grants for our retired priests. Last year the total funds distributed at the end of the year were \$27,988. We want to increase this amount by encouraging more members to participate in the License Plate Program. By increasing the number of participants, we ensure the comfort and support of our current and future infirmed priests, while proclaiming we are “One Nation Under God”.

Members who do not get a Texas Knights of Columbus license plate can donate directly at tkofc.org under the Donate icon.

The Cardinal Medeiros Trust Fund, named in honor of former Bishop Humberto Medeiros (State Chaplain 1969-1970) was established in 1981. In 1998, the Cardinal Medeiros Fellow Program was established to augment the fund’s principal. The interest earned, funds the educational grants available from Texas State Charities. These educational grants benefit not only our Catholic students pursuing an education in secondary schools, but also the Catholic schools of each diocese. Refer to the “Educational Grant Report” in this supplement for further information as to determination and allocation. Your participation in becoming a Cardinal Medeiros Fellow or in bestowing this honor upon a Knight, spouse, deceased Knight, Bishop, or Priest will ensure the continued support of a son, daughter, grandson, or granddaughter in their pursuit of an advanced education. It is, in essence, the “gift that keeps on giving”. Six (6) new Fellows have been added to the membership roll this year, bringing the total membership as of March 15, 2025, to 370. A “Fellow” designation is based upon the one-time payment of \$1,000. A “sustaining membership” is available, with an initial submission of \$100 and subsequent contributions until \$1,000 is attained. All Fellows are awarded a plaque and a lapel pin. The Fellow’s name is engraved on the honor roll at the State Office. This honor roll is displayed at the Annual State Convention. Educational Grants Program

Under the Educational Grants Program, there are two programs. (1) The Catholic Schools Grants, and (2) The Individual Educational Grants.

The Catholic Schools Grants are administered directly by the Educational Grants Program Committee through the Bishops of the Dioceses and the Superintendents of Catholic Schools in the Dioceses.

The Individual Educational Grants are administered through the Council membership in the State of Texas.

Both the Catholic Schools Grants and the Student Grants are based on need.

The Educational Grant Program provides an allocated number of grants based on membership base per diocese, and for two at large. All grants are \$1,000 paid to the applicant’s selected institution in the applicant’s name. The applicant completes the Educational Grant Application and demonstrates through the application and personal essay his/her need for assistance. After the Texas State Council Convention, the monies are disbursed to the institution being attended by the approved winners

for each Diocese. This fraternal year, the Educational Grant Program for Students provides One Grant per Diocese and an Additional Grant for each 7,500 active Knights of Columbus members within that Diocese. The Texas State Council Educational Grant Committee received 46 grant applications.

In summary, nineteen (19) Diocese Recipients and four (4) at large recipients from the remaining top participants were awarded resulting in a total of 23 recipients for a state-wide total of \$23,000. (Each diocese is eligible for one “At-Large”)

Grant applications were accepted via emailed pdf attachments and a few through regular postal mail. The use of email enabled quick communication with the applicants, if necessary.

The applications per diocese were a high of nine applicants to a low of no applicants. Fourteen of the 15 Dioceses were represented this year.

The Aid to Education Committee thanks the State Officer, Directors, State Charity Team, State College Council Chairman, Diocesan Deputies, District Deputies, Grand Knights, and Brother Knights for all their support in promoting the Texas Knights of Columbus Aid to Education Grant.

The Chair of the Educational Grant Committee, Leonel Saenz Jr., would like to thank assistant chairman Ken Orze, Mario Mallari, Thomas Oaks, and Bob Schmidt for all their diligent work. Special thanks to the Knights of Columbus State office and staff for their valuable assistance throughout this process, and to Joe Jacobo, Charities Director.

Individual Educational Grants

The Texas State Council awards at least one \$1,000 Educational Grant per diocese. Two more \$1,000 Educational Grants are awarded “At Large”. The total number of grants for each diocese is determined using a formula based on the number of Knights in each diocese. Applications for these grants were due by midnight on March 1, 2025. Winners will be announced at the State Convention. The applicants completed an Educational Grant Application which included a personal essay that states the individual’s need. After the Texas State Council Convention, the monies are disbursed to the approved winners for each Diocese. This fraternal year, the Educational Grants Program is providing one grant per diocese and an additional \$1,000 Grant for each additional 7,500 active Knights of Columbus Members within that Diocese. This year there were 46 applicants from 14 of the 15 Dioceses in Texas.

Texas State Council Charities will award \$2,000 or more per diocese to designated Catholic Schools within each diocese. Prior to March 1, the Educational Grant Committee asked the Bishop of each Diocese, in conjunction with the Diocesan Superintendent or Director of Education of each Diocese, to designate schools in the Diocese to receive the funds and the amount (of at least \$500) each school is to receive. Funds will be provided to the designated schools in the Diocese after the State Convention. The total amount available for each Diocese will be determined using the same formula used for the individual grants which is based on the number of Knights in each Diocese. Each Diocese will receive at least one \$2,000 grant.		

The Catholic School Grant Program is administered directly by the Aid to Education Committee through the Bishop of the Diocese and the Superintendent of Catholic Schools in the Diocese. The Educational Grants Committee received a response indicating how they would like to have their grants awarded.

Emergency Response

Harry Storey, Chairman

In the early morning hours of July 4, 2025, a flash flood took the lives of 135 people, (including 37 children) in central Texas. There was flooding in San Angelo, Austin, and San Antonio dioceses.

Knights from throughout the nation have donated more than \$250,000 to Texas State Council Charity to assist those suffering from the floods. This includes \$20,000 and one hundred \$100 gift cards from the Supreme Council.

Councils have provided food for the 1st responders and clean-up assistance to those whose homes were damaged by the flooding.

The Texas State Council Charity is currently offering the following assistance:

Up to three \$100 gift cards to Brother Knights or widows of Knights who have suffered a loss from the flooding.

Grants of up to \$3000 to Brother Knights or widows of Knights whose homes or cars suffered uninsured damages.

Grants to councils of up to \$1500 to reimburse them for food and supplies to feed 1st responders or victims of the flooding.

Grants to Councils of up to \$500 to reimburse them for supplies to clean or provide minor repairs for homes damaged by the floods.

Worthy State Deputy Ron has also reached out to the Bishops in the affected dioceses to see if they need assistance.

The Emergency Response Coordinators have distributed \$1,700 in gift cards. After vetting by the Emergency Response Coordinators and the Emergency Response Chairman, the State Council Charity Board approved 5 grants totaling \$13,000.

The deadline to receive a gift card is August 30, 2025, and all grant requests must be submitted by September 15, 2025.

Meanwhile in Dallas, Diocesan Emergency Response Coordinator, Eduardo Valenzuela, lead a team of

Knights to do repairs at the Missionaries of Charity Maternity Home. This involved removing, painting, and re-installing bars on the upstairs and downstairs windows in the August heat. The Sisters were very pleased.

In Houston, Diocesan Emergency Response Coordinator, G Giegerich, obtained supplies and recruited a group of Knights from Council 17060 to fix the fence and do other repairs for a local Deacon. ERC G was also able to arrange Habitat for Humanity to repair the roof. In addition to being a retired Deacon, he is a disabled veteran who cares for two young grandchildren with disabilities. He was very appreciative of the assistance from his Brother Knights.

MINUTES OF THE 121ST ANNUAL MEETING
TEXAS STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS
APRIL 25 - 27, 2025

Worthy State Deputy Ron Alonzo officially opened the 121st meeting of the Texas State Council Knights of Columbus State Convention on Saturday April 26th, 2025. Worthy State Chaplain His Excellency Bishop Michael Mulvey of Corpus Christi then offered an opening prayer, urging Knights to embody the heart of Christ through mercy, kindness, and service. His words framed the gathering as not just administrative, but deeply spiritual. The assembly followed with the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Worthy Master of the Sword Sir Knight Edward Cantu, and the singing of the opening ode under the guidance of Worthy Past State Deputy Doug Oldmixon.

Motions were adopted to approve prior minutes, standing rules, and officer reports as printed in the convention supplement. The roll call of officers and dignitaries highlighted the presence of bishops, supreme director, and representatives, reflecting the breadth of leadership assembled.

Reports from the State Deputy and State Chaplain were received with encouragement. Bishop Mulvey emphasized the importance of “formation”—personal prayer and spiritual growth within councils—as the foundation for meaningful activity and service.

The session then shifted to reflections from Past State Deputies and Supreme Director.

• **Immediate Past State Deputy Terry Frugé** welcomed delegates warmly to Corpus Christi, weaving personal memories of his own journey through leadership roles. He encouraged new Grand Knights to embrace mentorship and growth, reminding them of the importance of continuity, elections, and preparing future leaders to keep Texas strong within the Order.

• **Supreme Director Alfredo Vela** delivered an energetic call to action. He urged councils to pursue Star Council, outlining requirements in membership, insurance participation, programs, reporting, safe environment training, and financial responsibility. His remarks emphasized both recognition and responsibility, encouraging Knights to “be on fire” in their leadership and service.

• **Past State Deputy Tim Von Dolen**, though absent due to medical needs, shared a recorded message. He recalled his motto from decades earlier—“Knights of Columbus keep the flame burning”—and urged members to strengthen the Church amid challenges. He

highlighted pro-life initiatives, including the John Paul II Life Center, sonogram technology, and plans for a life monument at the Texas Capitol, reminding Knights of their role as defenders of faith and family.

Past State Deputy Ray Newman closed with heartfelt gratitude, reflecting on the inspiration he draws from the fraternity and affirming that their collective work is aligned with God’s plan. His words left the assembly with a spirit of appreciation and renewed commitment.

The Audit Committee’s report was presented by Worthy State Treasurer Derek Rabey and adopted without objection. This was followed by the presentation of the proposed budget for the 2025–2026 fraternal year, which was likewise approved unanimously.

Worthy State Secretary Bob Goss presented the Credentials Committee report: 252 councils with two voting delegates, 86 councils with one voting delegate, total voting council delegates was 590; with a grand total voting strength of 596 delegates. The report was adopted, confirming the assembly’s authority to proceed.

Worthy State Deputy Terry Frugé then introduced our Worthy Insurance Liaison Juan Carlos Carlin to give his remarks. Afterwards a motion was made and approved to close this section of the Texas State Council meeting for purposes of opening the State Council Charities Meeting. He then adjourned the 121st State Convention meeting of the Texas State Council for the opening of the State Council Charities meeting.

The Convention was reconvened on Sunday April 27th with formal verification of membership credentials. Deacon Phúc Phan, Assistant to the State Chaplain, led the opening prayer. His words, rooted in the spirit of Easter and Divine Mercy Sunday, called Knights to be bold Catholic men of honor and virtue, guided by charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism. The prayer invoked the Blessed Mother and concluded with a communal Hail Mary. The assembly then joined in the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Worthy Master of the Sword Sir Knight Edward Cantu.

Worthy State Treasurer Derek Rabey introduced the Good of the Order Committee, recognizing its members for their service. Brother Tom Clark, State Culture of Life Chairman, presented the report, which emphasized prayer, solidarity, and Catholic values. The

report was adopted unanimously, affirming the Council's dedication to faith, family, and service.

Worthy State Secretary Bob Goss presented the Credentials Committee report: 260 councils with two voting delegates, 86 councils with one voting delegate, total voting council delegates was 606; with a grand total voting strength of 612 delegates. The report was adopted, confirming the assembly's authority to proceed with elections.

Worthy Past State Deputy Lou Barber chaired the election process, assisted by Worthy Past State Deputy Leo Hanus. Brother Danny Clark nominated his father-in-law, Ron Alonso, recounting Alonso's lifelong service to the Church and the Order. His biography highlighted:

- 45 years of membership in the Knights of Columbus
- Leadership roles from Grand Knight to District Deputy, Diocesan Deputy, and multiple state director positions
- Achievements in membership growth, charitable fundraising (including a record \$1,018,000 for state charities), and program leadership
- Service as State Secretary, State Deputy, and active parish involvement
- Membership in the Fourth Degree and the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre
- Dedication to faith, family, and professional responsibility

The nomination was seconded by an overwhelming number of councils across Texas, reflecting broad support. With no other nominations, Alonso was re-elected State Deputy for the 2025–2026 fraternal year. In his acceptance remarks, he expressed humility and gratitude, urging Knights to finish the current year strong and maintain Texas' leadership in the Circle of Honor. His words carried both joy and determination: "God bless you all, and God bless Texas".

The election for State Secretary had two nominees: Robert "Bob" Goss and Michael L. McLaughlin. After voting by ballots Bob Goss was re-elected as State Secretary. The rest of the State Officer positions were voted by acclamation. The State Officer's elected for the term July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026, is as follows:

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Texas State Council (the "Council") (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the fiscal years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Texas State Council as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the fiscal years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Texas State Council does not combine a related nonprofit organization in which it has a direct controlling financial interest. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require such combination. If the financial statements of State Council Charities had been combined with those of Texas State Council, total net assets would have been increased by \$1,318,797 and \$1,285,486 as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the change in net assets would increase by \$33,311 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2025 and decrease by \$11,606 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024, all respectively.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Council and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Council's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.


Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements, including omissions, are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Council's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Notes to Financial Statements

For the Fiscal Years Ended June 30, 2025 and 2024

Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Purpose of Organization

Texas State Council (the “Council”) is a nonprofit organization created under the laws of the state of Texas. The Council governs subordinate councils in the Texas jurisdiction in accordance with the Supreme Constitution and Laws of the Order. Additionally, the Council organizes, establishes, and maintains fraternal, charitable, educational, religious, community, and civic projects in conjunction with the subordinate councils and members in the state of Texas.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they are earned. Expenditures are recorded in the accounting period incurred, if measurable.

Basis of Presentation

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Financial statements presentation follows the recommendations of the *Not-for-Profit Entities* Topic of the Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC 958). Accordingly, net assets of the Council and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions – These types of net assets are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. This also includes net assets with Board designations for specific purposes, since these Board designations may be reversed by the Board of Directors at any time in the future.

Net assets with donor restrictions – These types of net assets are subject to donor-imposed stipulations, which limit their use by the Council, either permanently or temporarily, to a specific purpose and/or the passage of time. When a donor restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from donor restrictions. For the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Council had no net assets with donor restrictions.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Federal Income Taxes

The Council is a nonprofit organization exempt from Federal income taxes on its operating income under Section 501(c)(8) of the Internal Revenue Code, except to the extent of unrelated business income, if any.

The most significant tax positions of the Council are its assertion that it is exempt from income taxes and its determination of whether any revenue amounts are subject to unrelated business income tax (UBIT). Management has determined that the Council had no activities subject to UBIT during the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024. All significant tax positions have been considered by management and it has determined that it is more likely than not that all tax positions would be sustained upon examination by taxing authorities.

The Council is required to file Form 990 (Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax), which is subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), generally up to three years from the later of the original due date or the date the tax return was filed. The Forms 990 for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2024, 2023, and 2022 are open to examination by the IRS as of June 30, 2025.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand and all highly liquid investments with maturities of 90 days or less from the date of purchase.

Per Capita Receivables

Per capita receivables represent amounts of prior fiscal year unpaid per capita membership dues from the local councils. The Council provides for expected credit losses through a charge to bad debt expense and a credit to a valuation allowance based on historical experience, current conditions, and reasonable and supportable forecasts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable. Changes in the valuation allowance have not been material to the financial statements.

Investments

Under FASB ASC 958, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values are reported at their fair market values in the statements of financial position. Net investment earnings is reported in the statements of activities as an increase or decrease in net assets without donor restrictions and consists of interest and dividend income, realized and unrealized gains and losses, less investment expenses.

Donated Services

The Council receives substantial amounts of services donated by Texas Knights of Columbus members. Because of the difficulty in assigning values of such services, these items are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue streams have various performance obligations and are recognized as described below:

Per Capita Dues

Per Capita dues to the Council are recognized as revenue over time as the performance obligations to deliver services to members occur ratably throughout the fiscal year.

State Convention Income

State Convention income is recognized at a point in time when the State convention is held.

Meeting and Convention Income

Meeting and Convention income is recognized at a point in time when the meeting or convention is held.

Football Sweepstakes Income

Football Sweepstakes income is recognized at a point in time when the funds are received.

Reimbursements from State Council Charities

Reimbursements from State Council Charities (the “Organization”) are recognized as revenue over time as the Council incurs expenses from the Organization.

State Athletics Income

State Athletics income is recognized at a point in time when the athletic tournaments are held.

Allocation of Expenses

The expense information contained in the statements of activities is presented on a functional basis. Accordingly, certain expenses are allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. Expenses which cannot be specifically identified have been allocated based on management’s best estimate of usage. Personnel and benefits are allocated based on estimated time spent by the employees for each function. Occupancy and operating lease expenses are allocated based on the estimated space usage.

Leases

Management reviews contracts to identify leases and properly classify leases as either operating or finance. Operating right-of-use (ROU) liabilities are recognized based on the net present value of lease payments over the lease term at the commencement date of the lease, and are reduced by payments made on each lease on the straight-line basis. Since most of the leases do not provide an implicit rate of return, the Council uses its incremental borrowing rate based on information available at the commencement date of the lease in determining the present value of lease payments. Therefore, the Council generally uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for the lease. The Council's incremental borrowing rate for a lease is the rate of interest it would have to pay on a collateralized basis to borrow an amount equal to the lease payments using similar terms.

If a lease contains a renewal option at the commencement date and management considers it reasonably certain that the option will be exercised to renew the lease, the renewal option payments are included in the determination of the ROU assets and lease liabilities. Leases with an initial term of 12 months or less are not recorded on the statements of financial position; rather, rent expense for these short-term leases is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term, or when incurred if a month-to-month lease.

All lease agreements generally require the Council to pay maintenance, repairs, property taxes, and insurance costs, which are variable amounts based on actual costs incurred during each applicable period. Such costs are not included in the determination of the ROU lease liability or ROU lease asset.

Variable lease payments associated with the Council's leases are recognized when the event, activity, or circumstance in the lease agreement on which those payments are assessed occurs. Variable lease payments are presented in expenses in the statements of activities.

Date of Management's Review

In preparing the financial statements, the Council has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through December 05, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 – Concentrations and Credit Risk

The Council employs cash management techniques that attempt to maximize interest income and minimize uninsured balances in their financial institutions and investment firms, which are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or the Security Investment Protection Corporation (SIPC). Effective January 1, 2013, deposit insurance coverage by the FDIC was changed to \$250,000 per bank per entity for all interest bearing and non-interest bearing accounts. Securities are protected by the SIPC which currently protects brokerage accounts up to \$500,000 in securities, including up to \$250,000 for cash. Additional coverage is frequently offered for brokerage accounts for amounts in excess of the \$500,000 SIPC limit. At June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Council had uninsured balances of \$2,039,193 and \$1,987,594, respectively. It is the Council's policy to maintain these accounts at high quality investment firms and financial institutions. The Council has not experienced any losses in these accounts in the past.

Note 4 – Fair Value Disclosures

The Council follows the provisions of FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, whose provisions relate to the Council's financial assets and liabilities be carried at fair value and the Council's fair value disclosures related to financial assets and liabilities. FASB ASC 820 defines fair value, expands related disclosure requirements, and specifies a hierarchy of valuation techniques based on the nature of the inputs used to develop the measures of fair value.

Guidance provided by the FASB defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. When measuring fair value, a fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). Inputs are broadly defined as assumptions market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Council has the ability to access at the measurement date. The type of investments included in Level 1 includes listed equities and listed derivatives.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3: Inputs that are unobservable for the asset or liability and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the asset or liability.

The asset’s or liability’s fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The valuation methods used may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of the net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Council believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2025.

Note 7 – Related Party

State Council Charities (the “Organization”) is a related nonprofit organization and the Council has a direct controlling financial interest in the Organization. The Council records all shared personnel expenses in the Council’s accounting records and then allocates the cost to the Organization based on the personnel’s allocation of time. The Organization reimburses the Council for all costs associated with the use of employees incurred by the Council on behalf of the Organization. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Council incurred and was subsequently reimbursed for \$105,295 and \$108,278, respectively, in personnel costs on behalf of the Organization. Total receivables from the Organization at June 30, 2025 and 2024 was \$627 and \$0, respectively.

Note 8 – Retirement Plans

The Council maintains a 403(b) tax-sheltered annuity retirement plan (the “Plan”) that covers staff employees who meet certain eligibility requirements. The Plan requires the Council to make contributions of 6% of eligible salaries. The Council’s contributions to the Plan for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 totaled \$7,234 and \$7,010, respectively. The Council also maintains a defined contribution retirement plan (the “Contribution Plan”) that covers the Executive Secretary. The Contribution Plan requires the Council to make contributions of 6% of eligible salary. The Council’s contributions to the Contribution Plan for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024 totaled \$5,102 and \$5,547, respectively.

Note 9 – Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets

The Council’s working capital and cash flows are related to the timing of receipts for payments of per capita dues, meeting and convention income, and investment earnings.

The following reflects the Council’s financial assets as of the statements of financial position date, reduced by amounts not available for general use within one year of the statements of financial position date because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions or internal designations. Amounts available include donor-restricted amounts that are available for expenditure in the following fiscal year. Amounts not available include amounts set aside for operating and other reserves that could be drawn upon if the Council’s Board of Directors approves that action.

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of State Council Charities (the "Organization") (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the fiscal years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of State Council Charities as of June 30, 2025 and 2024, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the fiscal years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

State Council Charities does not combine a related nonprofit organization which has a direct controlling financial interest in State Council Charities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require such a combination. If the financial statements of the Texas State Council had been combined with those of State Council Charities, total net assets would have been increased by \$2,114,540 and \$2,071,768 as of June 30, 2025 and 2024 and the change in net assets would increase by \$42,772 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2025 and decrease by \$43,061 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024, all respectively.

As explained in Note 5, State Council Charities reported certain investments at cost rather than at fair value during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024 and, therefore, did not recognize unrealized gains or losses in the statements of activities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require investments to be reported at fair value. The effects of this departure are not readily determinable.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Organization and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

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In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.


Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Purpose of Organization

State Council Charities (the “Organization”) is a nonprofit organization created under the laws of the state of Texas. The Organization’s principal function is to provide support directly to the various Catholic Dioceses in Texas and to help fund diocesan programs. It is also affiliated with the Supreme Council Knights of Columbus (Supreme Council).

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they are earned. Expenditures are recorded in the accounting period incurred, if measurable.

Basis of Presentation

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Financial statements presentation follows the recommendations of the *Not-for-Profit Entities* Topic of the Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC 958). Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions – These types of net assets are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. This also includes net assets with Board designations for specific purposes, since these Board designations may be reversed by the Board of Directors at any time in the future.

Net assets with donor restrictions – These types of net assets are subject to donor-imposed stipulations, which limit their use by the Organization, either permanently or temporarily, to a specific purpose and/or the passage of time. When a donor restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from donor restrictions.

Federal Income Taxes

The Organization is a nonprofit organization exempt from Federal income taxes on its operating income under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, except to the extent of unrelated business income, if any.

The most significant tax positions of the Organization are its assertion that it is exempt from income taxes and its determination of whether any revenue amounts are subject to unrelated business income tax (UBIT). Management has determined that the Organization had no activities subject to UBIT during the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024. All significant tax positions have been considered by management and it has determined that it is more likely than not that all tax positions would be sustained upon examination by taxing authorities.

The Organization is required to file Form 990 (Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax), which is subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), generally up to three years from the later of the original due date or the date the tax return was filed. The Forms 990 for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2024, 2023, and 2022 are open to examination by the IRS as of June 30, 2025.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of cash on hand and all highly liquid investments with maturities of 90 days or less from the date of purchase.

Investments

As discussed in Note 5, certain investments were reported at cost in the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2024. U.S. GAAP requires investments to be reported at fair value. Because Knights of Columbus Charities USA, Inc. (a related party) managed these investments and was unable to provide fair value information related to these investments, the Organization recorded these investments at cost and no unrealized gains or losses were recognized in these financial statements. Net investment return is reported in the statements of activities as an increase or decrease in net assets without donor restrictions and consists of interest and dividend income, realized and unrealized gains and losses related to operating investments reported at fair value, less external and direct internal investment expenses.

Donated Services

The Organization receives substantial amounts of services donated by the Texas Knights of Columbus members. Because of the difficulty in assigning values for such services, these items are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements.

Revenues

Contributions, including promises to give, are recorded when made. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the revenues are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the nature of the donor restrictions. When a donor restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from donor restrictions. Conditional promises to give are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met.

Allocation of Expenses

The expense information contained in the statements of activities is presented on a functional basis. Accordingly, certain expenses are allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. Expenses which cannot be specifically identified have been allocated based on management's best estimate of usage. Salaries and wages are allocated based on estimated time spent by the employees for each function.

Date of Management's Review

In preparing the financial statements, the Organization has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through December 05, 2025, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 – Concentrations and Credit Risk

The Organization employs cash management techniques that attempt to maximize interest income and minimize uninsured balances in their financial institutions and investment firms, which are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). Effective January 1, 2013, deposit insurance coverage by the FDIC was changed to \$250,000 per bank per entity for all interest bearing and non-interest-bearing accounts. At June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Organization had uninsured balances of \$1,843,516 and \$1,869,213, respectively. It is the Organization's policy to maintain these accounts at high quality investment firms and financial institutions. The Organization has not experienced any losses in these accounts in the past.

During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, 78% and 80%, respectively, of total support and revenues comes either directly from the Knights of Columbus members or indirectly from the members through the various Knights of Columbus subordinate councils throughout Texas Catholic dioceses. Management believes the Organization is not exposed to any significant credit risk related to contributions from local councils.

Note 3 – Fair Value Disclosures

The Organization follows the provisions of FASB ASC 820, *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*, whose provisions relate to the Organization's financial assets and liabilities be carried at fair value and the Organization's fair value disclosures related to financial assets and liabilities. FASB ASC 820 defines fair value, expands related disclosure requirements, and specifies a hierarchy of valuation techniques based on the nature of the inputs used to develop the fair value measures.

Guidance provided by the FASB defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. When measuring fair value, a fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). Inputs are broadly defined as assumptions market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access at the measurement date. The type of investments included in Level 1 includes listed equities and listed derivatives.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.

Level 3: Inputs that are unobservable for the asset or liability and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the asset or liability.

The asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

Valuation techniques used to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The valuation methods used may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of the net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2025.

Note 5 – Investments Managed by Related Party

The Christopher Fund is a matching fund contribution program established by the Supreme Council in 1992. Each year, the Organization may contribute to the fund up to \$5 per new Texas member to the Christopher Fund. The Christopher Fund was managed by the Knights of Columbus Charities, USA, Inc., a related party. If the Organization were to discontinue participation in the program and request distribution of its funds, the distribution would be at the market value or book value, whichever was less. In accordance with the terms of the Christopher Fund, the market value was determined as of the Supreme Council Charities' last semi-annual audit prior to a withdrawal request. Because the market value was not determinable at June 30, 2024, the Organization's investments in the Christopher Fund were carried at original cost. No unrealized gains or losses related to the investments in the Christopher Fund were recognized in these financial statements. In October 2024, the Organization requested distribution of the funds held with Knights of Columbus Charities, USA, Inc. Once the distribution was received, the Organization deposited the funds into its operating investments account.

The Cardinal Medeiros Trust Fund was also managed by the Knights of Columbus Charities, USA, Inc., a related party. Contributions are made to the Cardinal Medeiros Trust Fund based on the amounts received by the Organization from donors. Because the market value was not determinable at June 30, 2024, the Organization's investments in the Cardinal Medeiros Trust Fund were carried at original cost. No unrealized gains or losses related to the investments in the Cardinal Medeiros Trust Fund were recognized in these financial statements. In October 2024, the Organization requested distribution of the funds held with Knights of Columbus Charities, USA, Inc. Once the distribution was received, the Organization deposited the funds into its operating investments account. As of June 30, 2025 and 2024, contributions totaling \$0 and \$3,700, respectively, remained in cash and cash equivalents with donor restrictions to be transferred into the investment account.

Note 8 – Related Party

Texas State Council (the “Council”) is a related nonprofit organization and has a direct controlling financial interest in the Organization. The Council records all shared personnel expenses in the Council’s accounting records and then allocates the cost to the Organization based on the personnel’s allocation of time. The Organization reimburses the Council for all costs associated with the use of employees incurred by the Council on behalf of the Organization. During the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, the Council paid \$105,295 and \$108,278, respectively, in personnel costs, which were reimbursed by the Organization. Total payables due to the Council at June 30, 2025 and 2024 was \$627 and \$0, respectively.

Note 9 – Commitments and Contingencies

During the Spring of each calendar year, the Organization commits scholarships to Texas students. However, these scholarships are contingent upon students providing proof of enrollment and therefore are not actually awarded until that happens in the Fall. Accordingly, the liability and corresponding expense are not recorded until the scholarships are awarded. The scholarships committed totaled approximately \$23,000 each year.

Note 10 – Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets

The Organization's working capital and cash flows are related to the timing of receipts for contributions.

The following reflects the Organization's financial assets as of the statements of financial position date, reduced by amounts not available for general use within one year of the statements of financial position date because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions or internal designations. Amounts available include donor-restricted amounts that are available for expenditure in the following fiscal year. By-Laws of The Texas State Council

ARTICLE I - DEFINITIONS

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS OF TERMS:

A. "Affiliated Organization" means an organization which is closely associated with the Texas State Council and in which the officers of the Texas State Council may serve as officers or members of its board. Affiliated Organizations include, but are not limited to, the Texas State Council Charities, Inc.

B. "By-Laws" means the By-Laws of the Texas State Council, Knights of Columbus.

C. "Constitution" means the Charter Constitution and Laws of the Knights of Columbus.

D. "Convention" means the Texas State Council Knights of Columbus Convention.

E. "Diocesan Deputies" means an individual appointed by the State Deputy to coordinate the activities of District Deputies and Subordinate Councils within the boundaries of a Diocese of the Church in Texas.

F. "District Deputy" means an individual nominated and appointed by the State Deputy and approved by the Supreme Knight to serve as a District Deputy.

G. "Fraternal Year" means the period of time from July 1 through June 30.

H. "Immediate Past State Deputy" means the Past State Deputy who most recently served as State Deputy in Texas and who actually resides in the State of Texas.

I. "P.S.D. Advisory Committee" means Past State Deputies Advisory Committee.

J. "Robert's Rules of Order" means the edition and the version of Robert's Rules of Order, also known as Robert's Rules of Parliamentary Order, selected and designated by the State Advocate.

K. "State Council" means the Texas State Council, Knights of Columbus.

L. "State Officers" means the officers of the Texas State Council as set forth in Article III, Section 1 of these By-Laws.

M. "Subordinate Council" or "Subordinate Councils" means a Knights of Columbus Council or Councils in the State of Texas.

ARTICLE II - STRUCTURE

SECTION 1. NAME AND JURISDICTION:

This organization shall be known as the Texas State Council, Knights of Columbus, hereinafter referred to as "State Council". Its jurisdiction shall be co-extensive with the boundaries of the State of Texas and it shall be subject to and governed by these By-Laws and the Constitution.

SECTION 2. LEGAL STRUCTURE:

The State Council is an unincorporated association of its members and is governed by the actions of its officers under the leadership of the State Deputy.

SECTION 3. PURPOSES:

The purposes of the State Council include, but are not limited to, (A) govern the Subordinate Councils in accordance with the Constitution and these By-Laws, (B) to organize, establish and maintain fraternal, charitable, educational, religious, public, community or civic projects to be supported, in whole or in part, by the State Council and/or the Subordinate Councils, and (C) assemble once each year in convention to elect certain officers and delegates, to consider resolutions, and conduct such other business as may properly come before the convention.

SECTION 4. MEMBERSHIP:

(A) The voting membership of the State Council shall consist of: (1) the Grand Knight, and a Past Grand Knight or the Deputy Grand Knight, or their duly elected representatives, actually residing in the State of Texas from each Subordinate Council in good standing, and (2) State Officers.

(B) Except as otherwise provided herein, the non-voting membership of the State Council, who shall be permitted all other privileges of membership, shall consist of: (1) Past State Deputies, (2) District Deputies, and (3) ex-officio State Officers.

(C) An ex-officio State Officer is defined as (1) a former State Deputy who fails to qualify as a Past State Deputy pursuant to the Laws of the Order, and (2) a former State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate or State Warden who had not served as a State Deputy. An ex officio State Officer has no voting privileges as a State Officer.

(D) Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the State Council, not to exceed twelve, who are not otherwise members of the State Council, shall be permitted the privilege of the floor for the limited purpose of speaking on questions pertaining to the functions of their particular committee, but without the vote therein.

(E) No member of the State Council shall be admitted to participate in the Convention sessions unless such member is in good standing. The Credentials Committee must certify and authenticate all credential holders as being authorized to be seated at the Convention.

SECTION 5. STANDING COMMITTEES:

(A) The State Deputy shall annually establish and appoint the members to the permanent Standing Committees which shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

1. The Fraternal Benefits Committee shall consist of the General Agents of Texas and shall be chaired by a General Agent appointed as the Insurance Liaison.

2. The Audit Committee shall consist of at least four (4) members, not less than three (3) of whom shall be certified or chartered public accountants. The State Treasurer and the Executive Secretary shall not be members of the Committee.

3. The Budget Committee shall consist of the State Officers.

4. The By-Laws Committee shall consist of at least five (5) and not more than seven (7) members, including the State Advocate who shall be the Chair.

5. The P.S.D. Advisory Committee shall consist of all Past State Deputies who meet the requirements of Article III, Section 12(A).

6. The Legal Affairs Committee shall consist of the State Advocate, who shall be the Chair, and at least two (2) additional attorneys who are Third Degree members and admitted to the State Bar of Texas.

(B) The State Deputy may establish and appoint the members of the special Standing Committees.

(C) The membership of all Standing Committees shall consist of individuals who are in good standing from Subordinate Councils.

(D) All Committee appointments shall be for a period not to exceed the Fraternal Year, with no restrictions regarding previous service on a Committee.

(E) All Committees are advisory in nature and make recommendations for action on topics within their jurisdictions as indicated in the By-Laws or as assigned by the State Deputy. All authority for action is reserved to the State Council assembled in Convention or to the State Officers as appropriate.

SECTION 6. APPENDIXES:

The Convention may establish procedural guidelines which may be attached as appendixes to the By-Laws. Summaries of procedural resolutions concerning organizational and financial matters may also be attached as appendices to the By-Laws.

SECTION 7. INTERPRETATION OF BY-LAWS AND ROBERT'S RULES:

(A) All questions, relating to the interpretation of these By-Laws and any appendices, shall first be submitted to the State Advocate for a legal opinion and ruling. Appeals from the ruling of the State Advocate may be taken to the Supreme Advocate and, thereafter, to the Supreme Board.

(B) To the extent that Robert's Rules of Order are consistent with these By-Laws and any appendices hereto, Robert's Rules of Order, shall govern; however, Robert's Rules of Order shall be subject to the same rules of interpretation as stated in Section 7(A).

ARTICLE III - OFFICERS AND DUTIES

SECTION 1. STATE OFFICERS:

(A) The officers of the State Council are: State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate, State Warden, Immediate Past State Deputy, and State Chaplain.

(B) Each year, the State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden shall be elected to serve a one-year term by a majority of the voting membership of the Texas State Council present at the convention.

SECTION 2. DUTIES:

The duties of the respective State Officers shall be those specifically mentioned in the Constitution, these By-Laws, and such other duties as the State Council may direct.

SECTION 3. STATE DEPUTY:

(A) The State Deputy shall designate and appoint all committees and the chairman thereof unless the By-Laws provide otherwise. The State Deputy shall appoint members of the Standing Committees from the Texas Knights of Columbus membership at large. All Convention Committees, other than Standing Committees, shall be appointed from the membership of the State Council, unless otherwise directed by the State Council. The State Deputy may also appoint special committees between annual sessions when the exigency of circumstances demands such appointments. All committee appointments shall be for a period not to exceed the Fraternal Year, with no restrictions regarding previous service on a committee. Subject to these By-Laws, members of all committees serve at the pleasure of the State Deputy until the end of the Fraternal Year.

(B) In addition to allowances granted by Supreme Council for his necessary and incidental expenses, the State Deputy shall be reimbursed by the State Council for reasonable and necessary expenses incidental to the performance of his duties. The State Officers shall be entitled to hire and determine the salary of a clerk at State Council expense to assist in performing the duties of the State Deputy.

(C) The State Deputy may call meetings of the State Officers, State Committees, Diocesan Deputies, or District Deputies and the expense incident thereto, when not chargeable to the Supreme Council, shall be paid out of the State Council funds.

(D) The State Deputy shall countersign all vouchers and all checks for the expenditure of State Council funds, except the checks on the Executive Secretary's revolving check account.

(E) The honorarium paid to the State Deputy shall be \$5.00 per Subordinate Council per annum, which shall be paid by the State Council. In addition, all reasonable and customary expenses of the State Deputy incurred while attending the Supreme Convention shall be paid by the State Council.

(F) A member who has served four terms in the office of State Deputy shall be ineligible for subsequent election or appointment to that office. Further, a member may serve no more than two full terms consecutively as State Deputy. The member must be out of office at least two years prior to being re-elected for a third term as State Deputy.

SECTION 4. STATE SECRETARY:

(A) The State Secretary or his designee shall act as recorder at the meetings of the State Council, the Convention, State Officers, the District Deputies, Diocesan Deputies, or State Committees.

(B) The State Secretary or his designee shall prepare and furnish the Convention credential blanks to the Grand Knight of all Subordinate Councils on or before forty-five (45) days prior to the Convention.

(C) The honorarium paid to the State Secretary shall be \$2.00 per Subordinate Council per annum, which shall be paid by the State Council.

(D) The State Secretary shall be reimbursed by the State Council for reasonable and necessary expenses incidental to the performance of his duties. The State Officers shall be entitled to hire and determine the salary of a clerk at the expense of the State Council to assist in performing the duties of the State Secretary.

(E) The State Secretary shall have oversight responsibility for all fund raising programs of the State Council.

(F) In the event of an incapacity or absence from the State of the State Deputy or State Treasurer, the State Secretary may approve vouchers and countersign checks for the State Deputy or the State Treasurer.

SECTION 5. STATE TREASURER:

(A) The State Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds and securities of the State Council. He shall keep sufficient, true and accurate records of all funds of the State Council and obtain similar information on Affiliated Organizations to allow the preparation of an annual report in accordance with Section 56(b) of the Constitution. Under the direction of the State Treasurer, all funds shall be immediately deposited in the name of the State Council in depositories selected, as provided in Section 5 of Article V. He shall review all vouchers and checks signed by the State Deputy. If the voucher and the checks are correct, the State Treasurer shall sign the voucher and countersign the check. He shall be a voting ex-officio member of all State Council Committees handling any money of the State Council.

(B) He shall give to the State Council a bond in an amount and with a surety approved by the State Officers. The premium shall be paid by the State Council.

(C) The honorarium paid to the State Treasurer shall be \$2.00 per Subordinate Council per annum, which shall be paid by the State Council.

(D) The State Treasurer shall be reimbursed by the State Council for reasonable and necessary expenses incidental to the performance of his duties. The State Officers shall be entitled to hire and determine the salary of a clerk at the expense of the State Council to assist in performing the duties of the State Treasurer.

SECTION 6. STATE ADVOCATE:

(A) The State Advocate shall be an attorney admitted to the bar of the State of Texas. He shall be the legal advisor of the State Council and the State Officers in all matters pertaining to the State Council. He may be paid such fees as the State Officers approve for the legal work performed.

(B) The State Advocate shall be the parliamentarian for the Convention. When the State Advocate is not present on the Convention floor, he shall appoint one or more alternate parliamentarians to act in his absence.

(C) When forwarding the Resolutions to the Executive Secretary, the State Advocate shall designate the applicable edition of Robert's Rules of Order and the appointed alternate parliamentarians. Such information shall be distributed by the Executive Secretary along with the Resolutions.

(D) The honorarium paid to the State Advocate shall be \$1.00 per Subordinate Council per annum, which shall be paid by the State Council.

SECTION 7. STATE WARDEN:

(A) The State Warden or his designees shall be present at all meetings of the State Council, shall check membership cards, and shall admit non-members at the discretion of the State Council. He shall act as Sergeant-of-Arms at all meetings of the State Council.

(B) The honorarium paid to the State Warden shall be \$0.75 per Subordinate Council per annum, which shall be paid by the State Council.

SECTION 8. STATE CHAPLAIN:

The State Chaplain shall be appointed by the State Deputy and shall be a voting member of the State Council. He shall advise the State Council on all phases of its religious work and activities. The State Chaplain shall be in charge of and conduct all religious exercises of the State Council. The State Deputy, with the consent of the State Chaplain, shall appoint an Associate Chaplain who, in the absence of the Chaplain, shall act in his behalf and shall vote at

State Officer's meetings on behalf of the Chaplain.

SECTION 9. ELECTRONIC VOTING AND NOTICE:

Motions on the business of the Texas State Council may be made by email, sent simultaneously to the last known email address of the voting State Officers. Any motion made shall be deemed to have not passed until a majority of eligible voting State Officers has voted in the affirmative. A copy of the email motion and votes cast by email shall be recorded in the official minutes of Texas State Council meetings at the next regular State Officers meeting.

SECTION 10. MEETING CALLED BY STATE OFFICERS:

A majority of the State Officers may call a meeting of the State Officers upon giving five (5) days written notice to the State Officers of the time and place of the meeting. The written notice shall include an agenda of the topics to be discussed. Such written notice may be sent by email.

SECTION 11. ORDER OF SUCCESSION:

In the event that the State Deputy is no longer able to function in his capacity as State Deputy as determined by two thirds of the other State Officers, is removed from office, dies or resigns, then the State Secretary shall act as State Deputy for the remainder of the fraternal year until succeeded by the newly elected State Deputy.

In the event that any other State Officer is unable to function in his capacity as a State Officer as determined by two thirds of the other State Officers, is removed from office, dies or resigns, then the State Deputy shall delegate that State Officer's duties to one or more of the other State Officers for the remainder of the fraternal year.

SECTION 12. PAST STATE DEPUTIES ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

(A) Membership in the P.S.D. Advisory Committee shall consist of all Past State Deputies who have served in the State of Texas and who are members in good standing. They shall serve as long as they retain their eligibility. The Immediate Past State Deputy shall be chairman of the P.S.D. Advisory Committee. At the beginning of each Fraternal Year, the P.S.D. Advisory Committee shall elect a Chairman Pro Tem who shall serve if the Immediate Past State Deputy is incapacitated or absent. There shall be no limit on the number of members on the P.S.D. Advisory Commit-

tee. Meetings of the P.S.D. Advisory Committee may be called by either the State Deputy or the Immediate Past State Deputy.

(B) When the position of the Executive Secretary becomes vacant, the P.S.D. Advisory Committee may provide advice to the State Officers on a replacement Executive Secretary.

(C) The P.S.D. Advisory Committee may provide advice to the State Officers as to the employment or approval of an individual to fill the position of Editor of the Texas Knight or any other newsletter, bulletin or broadcast for circulation to the general membership authorized by the State Officers.

(D) If the position of the Executive Secretary or Editor of the Texas Knight becomes vacant during a Fraternal Year, it may be temporarily filled by a person selected by the State Officers to fill said position for a period not to exceed six months until the position can be filled in the normal course of business.

(E) The P.S.D. Advisory Committee shall vote upon the annual budget and such resolutions or amendments as are submitted under Article VI Section 7 (B) to indicate to the State Officers the Committee's advice regarding the adoption of the budget and each resolution or amendment. The vote may be conducted electronically.

SECTION 13. STATE COUNCIL AND OFFICERS ANNUAL REPORTS:

All State Officers, except the State Warden and the Immediate Past State Deputy, shall annually submit a written report to the Convention. The annual report of the State Council shall include (1) a copy of the By-Laws and appendixes, (2) the minutes of the preceding Convention, (3) most recent audits and summaries of the financial condition of the State Council and Affiliated Organizations prepared by the State Treasurer for the current Fraternal Year, (4) the State Officer's written report and (5) summaries of the major program Committee Directors' report on Council activities for the same period. The annual report will be distributed to each State Officer, Past State Deputy, District Deputy, Diocesan Deputy, Financial Secretary and Grand Knight in Texas.

ARTICLE IV – Executive Secretary:

(A) The Executive Secretary is not a State Officer but shall work with and assist all State Officers. The Executive Secretary shall be at least a third degree member in good standing of the Knights of Columbus. The Executive Secretary is an employee of the Texas State Council and is hired by the State Officers. The duties of this office shall be primarily assigned by the State Deputy, however, the State Officers may also assign other duties to the Executive Secretary from time to time. The office of the Executive Secretary shall be maintained in Austin, Texas; however, the site of this office may be changed upon the

recommendation of the State Officers and approval by the Convention.

(B) The Convention shall approve the budget for the Executive Secretary's office, which shall include the salary and benefits for the Executive Secretary and any clerks hired by the State Officers under Article III.

(C) The Executive Secretary shall manage the clerks and be accountable to the State Deputy. The Executive Secretary shall make an annual written report to the State Council at the Convention and shall furnish a copy of said report to the State Officers prior to the Convention.

(D) He shall give to the State Council a bond in an amount and with a surety approved by the State Officers. The premium shall be paid by the State Council.

(E) A bank account shall be opened and maintained in the name of the State Council in the city in which the Executive Secretary's office is located. Said account shall maintain a Two Thousand Dollar revolving fund upon which checks may be drawn by the Executive Secretary. He shall make a monthly written report to the State Deputy and the State Treasurer on all checks written on this account. Also, the monthly reconciled bank statement shall be furnished to the State Treasurer along with any other information concerning said account requested by the State Treasurer and/or the State Deputy.

(F) A State Officer may delegate a portion of his administrative duties to the Executive Secretary or to a clerk hired to assist the State Officer. However, any State Officer doing so shall remain responsible and accountable for such duties.

ARTICLE V - FINANCE

SECTION 1. BUDGET AND ASSESSMENTS:

At each Convention the State Officers, acting as the Budget Committee, shall present a budget to the Convention showing the estimated income and expenditures for the ensuing Fraternal Year. A budget which exceeds the current income, including any prior budget surplus of the State Council, shall not be approved unless the Per Capita Tax is increased by the Convention in an amount sufficient that the estimated income shall exceed the estimated expenditures. The Budget Committee shall recommend to the Convention the amount of any increase or decrease in the Per Capita Tax to be assessed each Subordinate Council to insure that the State Council will not have a deficit.

The Per Capita Tax to each Subordinate Council shall be based on the Subordinate Council's membership as reflected on the Supreme Council's records as of the following July 1. If no increase or decrease in the Per Capita Tax is recommended by the Budget Committee, then the Per Capita Tax shall remain at the same rate that it was in the preceding Fraternal Year.

SECTION 2. NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT:

The State Secretary shall, on or before September 1 of each year, send a notice to each Subordinate Council showing the amount of Per Capita Tax Assessment levied against it by the State Council. At least one-half of the Assessment shall be paid within 30 days of receipt of the notice. The remaining amount shall be paid on or before March 1 of the Fraternal Year.

SECTION 3. DEFAULTING COUNCILS:

Any Subordinate Council failing to timely pay an assessment duly levied by the State Council shall not be permitted representation at the Convention. It also may be suspended or dissolved, and its charter forfeited.

SECTION 4. AUTHORITY FOR DISBURSEMENT:

(A) Except the Revolving Fund of the Executive Secretary, each expenditure of the State Council funds shall be made only after the State Treasurer and the State Deputy have countersigned a voucher and a check. When countersigning each voucher and check, the State Deputy and the State Treasurer shall ascertain that the voucher and the check are drawn in payment for an obligation specifically authorized by the State Officers or the State Council. In the event an expenditure becomes immediately necessary and there has been no authorization by the State Council or the State Officers for such an expenditure, it shall be the duty of the State Deputy, before countersigning such a voucher and check, to notify all State Officers and to obtain the concurrence of at least three other State Officers. The State Deputy shall provide each State Officer with a written summary of the need for the action and final agreement of the State Officers within forty-eight (48) hours of the approval.

(B) Unless the funds are contained in the budget proposed under Section 1, no resolution or amendment requiring an appropriation of money from the State Council shall be acted upon by the Convention unless said resolution or amendment contains the source from which funds shall be obtained to meet the commitment and until said resolution or amendment has been submitted to and voted on by the P.S.D. Advisory Committee and the State Officers. The outcome of both votes will be disclosed as recommendations to the Convention before it votes.

SECTION 5. DEPOSIT OF MONEY:

(A) All monies of the State Council shall be deposited in depositories which have government deposit insurance, either FDIC insured or managed by an investment firm registered with FINRA, such as the Knights of Columbus Assets Advisors. Such depositories shall be selected by a majority vote of the State Officers.

(B) Any standard business depository procedure approved by a majority of the State Officers may be

utilized by the State Treasurer or his designee to improve the efficiency and operation of the State Council.

SECTION 6. RECORD OF FUNDS:

A separate record of the money of each of the different funds of the State Council shall be kept in the Treasurer's books.

SECTION 7. MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES:

The cost of badges and Convention printed matter, postage and other incidental expenses of the State Officers, Diocesan Deputies, District Deputies and Committee members shall be paid by the State Council when such expenses are not payable by the Supreme Council.

SECTION 8. MILEAGE AND PER DIEM:

(A) Members, State Officers, Chairman of Standing Committees, Members of Convention Committees, State Program Directors, State Membership Director, Diocesan Deputies, District Deputies and all Past State Deputies of the State Council shall receive, in lieu of all expenses, mileage reimbursement one way at the rate of fifteen cents per mile from the location of the individual's council to the site of the Convention. However, an individual shall only be paid in one such capacity. The per diem to the Convention may be reduced or not paid, at the discretion of the State Officers, if the per diem payment, in whole or in part, would cause the State Council to have a deficit at the end of the Fraternal Year. Any such reduction shall be applied equally to all those persons entitled to receive per diem.

(B) The State Council shall be responsible for the State Banquet. All members, per Article II, Section 4, shall be furnished a banquet ticket as part of their registration packet.

(C) Mileage and/or per diem to be paid to any qualified member of the Knights of Columbus for any organizational, committee or special meetings shall be paid at an equal rate and at the discretion of the State Deputy.

SECTION 9. SPECIAL AUDIT:

The P.S.D. Advisory Committee or the State Officers may require a special audit of the State Council books to be made when, in their judgment, one is necessary and shall hire the necessary personnel to carry out the audit. Expenses of the audit shall be paid by the State Council.

ARTICLE VI - CONVENTION

SECTION 1. DATE AND PLACE:

(A) Each year during April or May, the convention shall be convened within the state. The locations of future Convention sites and dates shall be decided by a majority of the State Officers

(B) Each Council or Chapter desiring the annual Convention to be held in a specific city shall submit an application to the State Officers by January 1 five years preceding the year in which the Convention is to be held and shall provide such additional information and plans as may be requested by the State Officers. The State Officers shall determine which cities are qualified and shall follow the selection process for determining the Convention site five years hence.

(C) If a conflict should occur on the date or site selected for the Convention, the State Officers, by majority vote, may change the convening of the Convention as to date or site to any other date or site between April 1 and June 1 of the year in question.

SECTION 2. PRESIDING OFFICER:

The State Deputy shall be the presiding officer at the Convention. If the State Deputy is incapacitated for any reason, absent or unable to preside at the Convention, the State Secretary shall preside.

SECTION 3. CREDENTIALS:

The Financial Secretary of each Subordinate Council shall prepare and certify credentials of delegates on the form furnished by the State Secretary or his designee and shall submit the form in accordance with the established procedure.

SECTION 4. TEMPORARY ROLL CALL:

The State Secretary or his designee shall prepare a roll of the names of all delegates and alternates based on the credentials presented to him prior to the calling to order of the Convention. The initial roll shall be the roll of the Convention until the Credentials Committee submits its report and the permanent roll is accepted by the Convention.

SECTION 5. DELEGATE SEATING CONTESTS:

In a delegate seating contest, each contestant may appear and present arguments and evidence to the Credentials Committee. Except by special consent of the Committee, each contestant shall be allowed no more than a five minute presentation. The Credentials Committee shall determine which delegate shall be seated. The Committee's decision may be appealed to the Convention.

SECTION 6. MEETINGS CONDUCTED:

All portions of the Convention meetings pertaining to the ceremonials and elections of the State Council shall be conducted in the third section. Any duly qualified First Degree member of the Knights of Columbus and wives may be admitted to the other portions of the Convention.

SECTION 7. RESOLUTIONS:

(A) All resolutions or petitions must be submitted in writing by either an officer of the State Council or by a Subordinate Council. The resolution or petition of a Subordinate Council shall be signed by the

Grand Knight and the Financial Secretary with the seal of such council affixed thereto.

(B) All resolutions and petitions, other than amendments to the By-laws, shall be submitted to the State Advocate at least sixty (60) days in advance of the Convention. The State Advocate shall return any resolution or petition, the adoption of which would be contrary to the Constitution or to the By-laws. Copies of all other resolutions and petitions shall be sent by the State Advocate to the Executive Secretary for distribution to the Subordinate Councils and all State Officers. The Executive Secretary shall distribute the resolutions not later than forty-five (45) days prior to the Convention. However, any duly submitted resolution or petition received in due time by the State Advocate, as provided herein, dealing with assessments, expenditures, or disposition of money or the assets of the State Council shall be submitted by the State Advocate to the State Officers for its consideration. Each resolution and petition dealing with the expenditures of the State Council's funds shall designate the source from which any such funds shall be obtained and the manner in which the funds shall be raised, if necessary. A copy of each such document shall be sent to the Executive Secretary for distribution with the other resolutions or petitions. Prior to distribution, the Executive Secretary shall certify that each resolution or petition submitted to the State Officers has been duly submitted by the State Advocate to the State Officers as referenced in this paragraph.

(C) Unless a resolution or petition has been timely filed with the State Advocate, no resolution or petition shall be considered by the State Council except under the following conditions:

(1) the out of time resolution or petition must be:

(a) presented in writing for deliberation and recommendation at the meeting of the Resolutions Committee held in conjunction with the Convention; and

(b) once all timely Resolutions have been voted on, the state Advocate will announce the existence of the out of time resolution(s) or petition(s) to the Resolution Committee, and

(c) the presenter of the out of time Resolution will be allowed ten (10) minutes to present why the out of time resolution should be considered;

(d) the Resolution Committee will vote on whether to allow the Resolution to go forward for a vote on the merits – a 2/3rd vote of the Resolution Committee members is required to proceed to the merits of the Resolution;

(i) if the out of time Resolution does not receive a 2/3rd vote, no further action is required, the motion is defeated;

(ii) if the out of time Resolution receives a 2/3rd vote, the presenter will have fifteen (15) minutes to present the merits of the out of time Resolution;

(iii) the Resolution committee members will vote on allowing the out of time Resolution to be allowed to be presented from the floor – a 2/3rd vote is required to pass;

(iv) if the out of time Resolution does not get 2/3rd vote of the Resolution Committee the Resolution fails;

(v) if the Resolution Committee approves the out of time Resolution by a 2/3rd vote, the out of time Resolution will be allowed to be presented to the State Delegates by a motion from the floor, after the votes on the on-time Resolution.

(vi) the out of time Resolution will require a 2/3rd vote by the State Delegates to be heard;

(vii) if the out of time Resolution receives a least 2/3rd votes of the State Convention Delegates, the out of time Resolution will be considered to be approved for consideration by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present and voting at the Convention;

(2) all Resolutions approved for consideration by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present and voting at the Convention.

(D) Resolutions of appreciation and memorial resolutions shall not be required to meet the provisions of Section 7 (B) and (C).

SECTION 8. ORDER OF BUSINESS:

The Order of Business of the Convention shall be:

- (1) Call to Order.
- (2) Prayer and Pledge of allegiance.
- (3) Reading of Minutes of Last Convention.
- (4) Reading of Communications and recognition of special guests.
- (5) Report of State Deputy.
- (6) Report of State Secretary.
- (7) Report of State Treasurer.
- (8) Report of State Advocate.
- (9) Report of State Chaplain (optional at Chaplain's discretion).
- (10) Report of Immediate Past State Deputy.
- (11) Report of Credentials Committee.
- (12) Reports of Resolutions Committee.

- (13) Reports to the Convention.
- (14) Unfinished Business.
- (15) New Business.
- (16) Election of State Officers, and election of Delegates and Alternates to Supreme Convention (Mandatory on Second Day).
- (17) Prayer Closing Convention.
- (18) Adjournment.

The Order of Business may be suspended by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present.

SECTION 9. CONVENTION COMMITTEES:

(A) The State Deputy shall establish and appoint the members to the Convention Committees which shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. The Credentials Committee which shall consist of up to five (5) members, including the State Secretary who shall be the Chair.
2. The Resolutions Committee which shall consist of not less than five (5) and not more than nine (9) members, including the State Advocate, who shall be the Chair, a member of the Legal Affairs Committee, a Past State Deputy, a District Deputy, and Grand Knights.
3. The Good of the Order Committee, which shall consist of not less than seven (7) and not more than eleven (11) members, shall make a written report to the Convention. The State Treasurer or his designee shall be the Chair.
4. The Standing Audit Committee shall be the Convention Audit Committee and shall make a written report to the Convention of the finances of the State Council and its Affiliated Organization as of April 1. It shall also review and report on the finances of State Council and its Affiliated Organizations to the date of the Convention.
5. The Standing Budget Committee, which shall consist of the State Officers, shall make a written report to the Convention.

(B) The membership of all Convention Committees, except the Standing Committees, shall consist of voting members of the State Council. All Convention Committees, except the Resolutions, the Good of the Order and the Credentials Committee, may be Standing Committees.

SECTION 10. CONVENTION REPORTS:

The Convention may by vote accept any Convention report, including Officer and Committee reports. However, any recommendations contained therein shall only be approved by a motion separate and apart from any acceptance of the report itself. Said motion shall specifically identify each recommendation presented to the Convention for approval.

SECTION 11. LEAVING MEETING:

Members of the State Council shall not leave the business meeting portion of the Convention without permission of the presiding officer. Violators of this section shall be subject to forfeiture of all mileage and per diem. The State Deputy or the presiding officer may require a roll call at any time to determine that all delegates are present.

SECTION 12. MEETINGS AND ROBERT'S RULES:

Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Convention and all other meetings of the State Council and its Committees insofar as they are applicable and not inconsistent with the Constitution and these By-Laws.

ARTICLE VII- ELECTIONS

SECTION 1. FORM OF BALLOT:

All State Officers, except the Chaplain, the Associate Chaplain, and any ex-officio State Officer, shall be elected by the Convention. All delegates to the Supreme Convention, except the State Deputy and the Immediate Past State Deputy, shall be elected by the Convention.

Nominating speeches for each State Officer shall be limited to one five minute speech and one two minute seconding speech. Nominating speeches for delegates to the Supreme Convention shall be limited to one two minute speech and a one minute seconding speech. By a majority vote, the Convention may further limit the nominating and seconding speeches.

SECTION 2. TELLERS:

Sufficient tellers shall be appointed by the presiding officer to work under the supervision of the State Warden or his designee.

SECTION 3. INDIVIDUAL BALLOTS:

The elections shall be by written ballot. If, however, when the nominations are closed, only one candidate is nominated for an office or when the number of candidates nominated equals the number of delegates to be elected, the Convention may, by voice, vote to elect the candidate or candidates by acclamation.

ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS TO THE BY-LAWS

SECTION 1. PROCEDURE:

(A) The By-laws may be amended at a Convention by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present and voting, provided such amendment first has been submitted in writing to the State Advocate, in accordance with Article VI, Section 7, at least ninety (90) days prior to the convening of the Convention. However, the Convention may consider an amendment to the By-Laws which had not been submitted to the State Advocate in accordance with this section if two-thirds of the delegates present and voting vote to consider the amendment. The Convention may adopt said amendment upon an affirmative vote by four-fifths of the delegates present and voting.

(B) Each proposed amendment to the By-laws properly submitted to the State Advocate shall be processed by the State Advocate and distributed by the Executive Secretary in the same manner that petitions and resolutions are distributed.

SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE:

These By-Laws and each amendment thereto shall take effect only upon approval by the Supreme Board of Directors. All other By-Laws, rules and regulations heretofore adopted are hereby repealed.

THE BYLAWS OF STATE COUNCIL CHARITIES

ARTICLE I - PURPOSE

SECTION 1. PURPOSE:

The Corporation is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, and educational purposes. In furtherance of those purposes, the corporation may establish centers for the dissemination of the truths of Christianity; maintain facilities for the proper physical, intellectual, and moral development of youth, and administer scholarship funds, and other grants for the benefit of deserving persons or entities.

ARTICLE II - OFFICE

SECTION 1. OFFICE:

The principal office of State Council Charities (the "Corporation") shall be in the City of Austin, Texas.

ARTICLE III – MEMBERSHIP AND MEETINGS

SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP:

Membership of the Corporation shall consist of two classes of members: 1) Sustaining – These are voting members who shall be the certified delegates to the Annual State Convention of the Texas State Council for the year that they are delegates only; and 2) Associate – These are non-voting members who shall be every other member of any Knights of Columbus council in the state of Texas who is not a voting member (sustaining) as set forth above.

SECTION 2. ANNUAL MEETINGS:

The annual meeting of the members shall be held each year at the time, at the place, and on a day during the weekend of the Texas State Council Knights of Columbus annual convention.

ARTICLE IV - DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. MANAGEMENT:

The affairs of the Corporation shall be managed by the Board of Directors who may exercise all such powers of the Corporation and do all such lawful acts and things as are not (by statute, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws) directed or required to be exercised or done by the members.

SECTION 2. NUMBER, QUALIFICATION, ELECTION AND TERM:

The authorized number of directors of this Corporation shall be not less than ten (10), but not more than thirteen

(13) (as determined from time to time by the Board of Directors). Each director shall hold office until his successor is elected and qualified or until his death, resignation, or removal.

(A) Seven of the directors shall be the officers of the Texas State Council. They shall include: President, Vice President-Secretary, Vice President-Spiritual, Vice President-Legal, Vice President-Arrangements, Treasurer and Immediate Past State Deputy.

(B) Any Supreme Director who is a member of a Subordinate Council and an ex-officio state officer shall also be a Director of the Corporation. Each officer and any ex-officio state officer has the right to vote as a State Council Charities Director. The term of office for each director, who is also an officer of the Texas State Council, shall be concurrent with his term of office as a state officer in the Texas State Council.

(C) The remaining directors shall be elected for a two (2) year term by the Board of Directors at the first called meeting of the Board for each fraternal year. In the case of death, resignation, or dismissal, a replacement director will be elected by the Board of Directors to fill the unexpired term. If the Supreme Director is the Immediate Past State Deputy, he is not an ex-officio member of the Board, but serves on the Board as the Immediate Past State Deputy. In this case the number of two year directors shall be elected accordingly.

(D) An individual must be a 3rd degree member of the Knights of Columbus to serve as a director.

SECTION 3. CHANGE IN NUMBER:

The number of directors may be increased or decreased, within said limits, from time to time, but no decrease shall have the effect of shortening the term of any incumbent director. Any directorship to be filled by reason of an increase in number of directors shall be filled by election at a meeting of the Directors.

SECTION 4. PLACE OF MEETINGS:

Meetings of the Board of Directors, regular or special, may be held within the State of Texas, at such place or places as shall be designated (from time to time) by the President.

SECTION 5. REGULAR MEETINGS:

The Board of Directors shall meet at least two (2) times a year at such times and places as may be designated by the President. Other regular meetings of the Board of Directors may be held at such times and places as

shall, from time to time, be determined by the President.

SECTION 6. SPECIAL MEETINGS:

Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the President on ten (10) day's notice to each director, either personally, by mail, by email, by facsimile, or by telephone. Special meetings shall be called by any other officer in like manner, and on like notice on the written request of two (2) directors, or the written request of one (1) director, if he should be the only director. Except as otherwise expressly provided by statute, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, neither the business to be transacted at, nor the purpose of, any special meeting need be specified in a notice or waiver of notice.

SECTION 7. QUORUM AND MAJORITY VOTE:

At meetings of the Board of Directors, a majority of the number of directors fixed by these Bylaws shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The act of a majority of the quorum of the directors present at a meeting shall be the act of the Board of Directors, except as otherwise specifically provided by statute, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws. If a quorum is not present at a meeting of the Board of Directors, the directors present may adjourn the meeting, from time to time, without notice other than announcement at the meeting, until a quorum is present. Proxy voting shall not be permitted.

SECTION 8. REMOVAL OF DIRECTOR:

Any director, who is not an officer of the Texas State Council, may be removed for cause by a majority vote of the all the other directors, whether present at the meeting or not. Good Cause shall mean the failure to attend two consecutive meetings or failure to fulfill the director's duties, or for other intentional or reckless misconduct. The meeting to remove the director must be announced in accordance with the bylaws, may not be waived and must set forth that removal of the director is on the agenda.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. NUMBER, QUALIFICATION, ELECTION AND TERM:

The corporation shall have a President, Vice President-Secretary, Vice President-Spiritual, Vice President-Legal, Vice President-Arrangements, Treasurer, Immediate Past State Deputy and such other officers, assistant officers, and agents as the Board of Directors may think necessary. The term of office for each officer, who is also an officer of the Texas State Council, shall be concurrent with his term of office as a state officer in the

Texas State Council.

SECTION 2. PRESIDENT:

The President shall be the State Deputy of the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Corporation. He shall preside at all meetings of the members and the Board of Directors, shall exercise general and active management of the affairs of the Corporation, and shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect. He shall perform such other duties and have such other authority and powers as the Board of Directors may from time to time prescribe.

SECTION 3. VICE PRESIDENT-SECRETARY:

The Vice President-Secretary shall be the State Secretary of the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus. The Vice President-Secretary shall, in the absence or disability of the President, perform the duties and have the authority and exercise the powers of the President. The Vice President-Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Board of Directors and all meetings of the members and record all votes, actions and the minutes of all proceedings in a book to be kept for that purpose. He shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings of the members and special meetings of the Board of Directors. The Vice President-Secretary shall perform such other duties and have such other authority and powers as the Board of Directors may, from time to time delegate.

SECTION 4. VICE PRESIDENT-SPIRITUAL:

The Vice President-Spiritual shall be the State Chaplain for the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus. If the Chaplain is absent, the Associate State Chaplain for the Texas State Council shall take the Chaplain's place and shall be entitled to vote.

SECTION 5. VICE PRESIDENT-LEGAL:

The Vice President-Legal shall be the State Advocate of the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus.

SECTION 6. VICE ARRANGEMENTS:

PRESIDENT-

The Vice President-Arrangements shall be the State Warden of the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus.

SECTION 7. TREASURER:

(A) The Treasurer shall be the State Treasurer of the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus.

(B) The Treasurer shall have the custody of the Corporation's funds and securities, shall keep full and accu-

rate accounts of receipts and disbursements of the Corporation, and shall deposit all funds and other valuables in the name and to the credit of the Corporation in depositories designated by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer may delegate all or a part of said duties to the Executive Secretary of the Texas State Council Knights of Columbus except for the custody and control of the Corporation funds and securities.

(C) If required by the Board of Directors, he shall give the Corporation a bond (in such form, in such sum, and with such surety or sureties as shall be satisfactory to the Board) for the faithful performance of the duties of his office and for the restoration to the Corporation, in case of his death, resignation, retirement, or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, monies, and other property of whatever kind in his possession or under his control belonging to the Corporation.

(D) He shall perform such other duties and have such other authority and powers as the Board of Directors may from time to time prescribe, or as the President may from time to time delegate.

(E) Each year prior to the annual members' meeting, the Treasurer shall submit to the Board of Directors for approval a budget for the next year. No money shall be spent on any unbudgeted item or purpose unless prior approval of a majority of the directors has been obtained.

SECTION 8. IMMEDIATE PAST STATE DEPUTY:

The Immediate Past State Deputy shall be the Immediate Past State Deputy of the Texas State Council of the Knights of Columbus.

ARTICLE VI – GENERAL PROVISIONS

SECTION 1. BOOKS AND RECORDS:

The Corporation shall keep complete books and records of accounts and minutes of the proceedings of its Annual Membership and Board of Directors meetings at its registered office or principal place of business.

SECTION 2. SEAL:

The Corporation elects to have no seal.

SECTION 3. NOTICES:

(A) Whenever by statute, the Articles of Incorporation, these Bylaws, or otherwise, notice is required to be given to a director or member, and no provision is made as to how the notice shall be given, it shall not be construed to require only personal notice, but any such notice must also be given either: (1) in writing by mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the director or member at

the address appearing on the books of the Corporation; or (2) by any other method permitted by law or specified in Article IV, Section 6 (Special Meetings). Any notice required or permitted to be given by mail shall be deemed given at the time when the same is deposited in the United States mail.

(B) Whenever, by statute, the Articles of Incorporation, or these Bylaws, notice is required to be given to members or directors, a waiver thereof in writing signed by the person or persons entitled to such notice, whether before or after the time stated in such notice, shall be equivalent to the giving of such notice. Attendance at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where a person attends for the express purpose of objecting to the transactions of any business on the ground that the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

SECTION 4. ACTION WITHOUT MEETING – TELEPHONE AND SIMILAR MEETINGS:

(A) Any action required by statute to be taken at a meeting of the members or the directors, or any action which may be taken at a meeting of the members or the directors may be taken without a meeting if a consent in writing, setting forth the action so taken, shall be signed by all of the directors, as the case may be, entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof, and such consent shall have the same force and effect as a unanimous vote of the directors, as the case may be. The signed consent or a signed copy shall be placed in the minutes book.

(B) Members and directors may participate in and hold a meeting by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment so that all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other. Participation in such a meeting shall constitute presence in person at the meeting, except where a person participates in the meeting for the express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business on the ground that the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

SECTION 5. INDEMNIFICATION OF OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS:

The Corporation shall, in accordance with Article 1396-2.22A of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act defend, hold harmless and indemnify the officers and directors of the Corporation from any claim to the maximum extent provided for under the law as now exist or may hereinafter be amended. The Corporation shall purchase and maintain Officer and Director liability insurance for the benefit of its officers and directors.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENTS OF BYLAWS:

(A) These Bylaws may be altered, amended, or repealed at any meeting of the Board of Directors at which a quorum is present by the affirmative vote of a majority of the directors present at such meeting, provided notice of the proposed alteration, amendment, or appeal is contained in the notice of the meeting.

(B) These Bylaws may also be altered, amended, or repealed at any meeting of the members at which a quorum is present, provided notice of the proposed alteration, amendment, or repeal is contained in the notice of the meeting.

SECTION 7. CONSTRUCTION:

(A) Whenever the context so requires, the masculine shall include the feminine and neuter, and the singular shall include the plural, and conversely.

(B) If any portion of these Bylaws shall be invalid or inoperative, then, so far as is reasonable and possible, the remainder of these Bylaws shall be considered valid and operative, and effect shall be given to the intent manifested by the portion held invalid or inoperative.

(C) The headings are for organization, convenience, and clarity. In the interpreting these Bylaws, they shall be subordinated in importance to the other written material.

SECTION 8. RELATION TO ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION:

These Bylaws are subject to, and governed by, the Articles of Incorporation.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE

These Bylaws will take effect July 1, 2003.
